Preface

Introduction

Thank you for signing up to be an advisor for CW Academy (CWA). CWA is the instructional arm of The CW Operators' Club (aka CWops), a club of amateur radio operators who enjoy using Morse code for a variety of on-air operations. CWA helps all levels of CW enthusiasts, from those who are just starting out to those who want to increase their skills, operating speeds, and CW activities. An advisor helps his or her students learn and improve their skills. Students truly appreciate your efforts, understanding that you are a volunteer trying to help them learn and improve their CW skills. You are providing a great service to the amateur radio community by participating as an advisor in CWA. And for that we want to thank you.

This document is written specifically for the new CWA CW Fundamentals level advisor. There is another new advisor document entitled **CW Academy Advisor Guidelines Ver-2.0.X** that covers the basic role of an advisor.

The CWA fundamentals class is the second level in progression. Most but not all students will be advancing from the CW Academy Beginners CW class where they learned the English alphabet, numbers, punctuation symbols slash (/) and question mark (?), and three pro-signs the <SK>, <BK> and <BT>.

The CWA Fundamentals class is probably the most important class in the CWops CW course structure. As an advisor you are assisting the student to progress from 25 WPM character speed with a Farnsworth speed of 4 WPM to a Farnsworth speed of 10 WPM or greater at class completion. The student, upon completion of the fundamentals class, is ready to "Get-On-The-AIR" and communicate using their newfound Morse code skills. As a fundamentals advisor your roll is to assist and encourage the student in their Morse code journey.

CW Academy Fundamental Level Curriculum

Here is the course outline that is presented to the students in the Fundamentals Curriculum document.

Course Overview

The Fundamental Level class accepts students who have learned Morse code characters and can copy and receive Morse code at around 6 words per minute.

The class initially concentrates on Instant Character Recognition (ICR) and on sending well-formed Morse code characters. The goal of ICR is to reduce the amount of time between hearing the character and knowing what the character is to almost instantaneously. About half the time will be spent working on sending 'readable' Morse code.

The course is eight weeks long with about an hour of homework each day during the week. Students who diligently do the homework every day and participate in the twice-weekly class activities will be successful in reaching the class objectives.

Class Objectives

By the end of the course, students should be able to copy Morse code at about 10-13 words per minute and send 'readable' Morse code at about the same rate. The student should have excellent Instant Character Recognition as well as be able to hear common two and three letter groups as words. The student should be ready to take the Intermediate Level CW Class, if desired. The student will also have experience using Morse code on the air and be capable of having a QSO at 10-13 words per minute.

Curriculum Organization

The daily homework assignments follow. Please note that the Advisor has the discretion to modify the homework assignments as needed to suit the class or individual student needs. The homework is organized by days. Three days' worth of homework is due for each online session. In class the advisor will likely discuss the homework, your progress, and provide advice and encouragement.

CW Fundamentals Class Options

As an advisor you have the option to conduct the sessions anyway you choose provided the student is able to meet the course objectives.

You are the expert and it's your job to advise and assist the students in reaching the stated goals.

If you choose to use the tools outlined in the published curriculum, learn the tools so you can assist the students when they have questions. The sessions' structure that follows is designed for a new advisor that plan to use the published tools and in the CW Fundamentals class. As mentioned above if decide to develop your own class structure this session information may or may not work for you.
